

Sonny de la Vega is Usnavi's younger cousin and works with Usnavi in the bodega. He has a thoughtful side that yearns for social justice.

Daniela is the owner of the salon where the neighborhood women come to gossip. She is very bold and loves the community.

Carla works at Daniela's salon and is her close friend.

Kevin Rosario is Nina's father, who owns the taxi cab service: Rosario's.

Camila Rosario is Nina's mother, who co-owns the taxi cab service.

Piragua Guy (Piragüero) is the owner of a small piragua stand that competes with a soft-serve truck.

Graffiti Pete is a graffiti artist. He is good friends with Sonny.

When I began rehearsal for *In The Heights*, I was invigorated! I believed we had a very talented and diverse cast and an artistic team that not only had positive energy and were ready to work, but I had a sense that the play really meant something to them personally. As I got to know them, that was confirmed as they started telling personal stories of their connection to the show that included what family meant to them and who in the play they most identified with. Some mentioned the character Usnavi searching for answers from his ancestors in the Dominican Republic seeking to return to his native country. Others mentioned Abuela Claudia a Cuban immigrant brought to the United States for a "better" life. Everyone had a character that inspired them, and they truly saw themselves in the story we were to tell. That's what makes doing this show with this special cast so much more powerful.

Getting to opening night was not an easy feat. Lynne and I would hear, "It's such a large musical!", "It will take a lot resources!", "Do we have the actors for that?", "Will we do the Latinx community justice?". These were just some of the questions that many of us committed to producing Heights had to face. But I kept saying to myself, I am a part of this community. I know how to tell this story, I have lived it! I am still living it as a Mexican American woman who went through many of the things the characters are struggling with or dreaming about. Through, education, planning, tears, and even despair we finally found so much joy, and we fought to tell this important story in the way the creators of the musical thought it should be told. Through music and dance, this multicultural, multi-generational, and bilingual play is the heart of the Hispanic and Latinx community here at Sonoma State (an HSI) and the larger Sonoma County area. This show was always meant to be a celebration of the diversity of people. I had a vision for representation from many groups on campus and beyond. We have criminology, nursing, psychology, history, business, music, and theatre majors in the show. We also have SSU alumni, a high school senior from Petaluma, 5th graders from Cali Calmecac Language Academy in Windsor and Hidden Valley Elementary School in Santa Rosa and members from the Sonoma County Theatre Community. Our cast represents America. We are finally here and this story will be told! Lin-Manuel Miranda said in an interview, "There's a song in Heights called "Hundreds of Stories," but there's millions of stories — from the cultural specificities of the Puerto Rican American experience, the Dominican American experience, the Cuban American experience." For me, it's the Mexican American experience. I am first generation college student like the character of Nina, and the first in my family to attend college and graduate with a college degree. That comes with a lot of pressure for many students who relate to balancing expectations from those "Back home" and the reality of the present. A Central Valley native, growing up in a bilingual home, always communing with my large family this story is the song in my heart and the pain in my soul from those that have left this earth and left me a legacy, and a history to uphold and shine light on. This show is one way I am doing that for those that have paved the way for many of us that are privileged to do what we love so freely.

As you watch the show, please ask yourself, "What is home to me?" Is it a place like a city or a country? Could it be wherever you feel like you can be yourself without judgement? A place where your close friends and family are? The characters in this play are searching for home, seeking a better life and following their dreams, and like many dreams, they do not come without challenges, hard decisions, and hard-work. Enjoy the show!
